It consists of two churches, Meth-Glen. dodist and Baptist, one store and filling station and a school. It is made up of the people of two communities, united in 1909, Brown school House, or Brownie, and Salt Hill, later known as Oak Glen.

The first church was built in 1909 and named Barton after the presiding elder of this district. therefore it has been known for years as Barton Chapel, or Barton.

This part of Jack Couunty was settled first. Barton is only a few miles from where the first permanent church was organized, the first school was taught, the first court and election were held, the first store, and the first house was built.

The first church was organized at Spring dale, four or five miles east of Barton, by the Baptists, in 1875, the land now being owned by the heirs of Henry Hensley; the first school was taught near the home of Alf Lane in Salt Hill community (Fort Worth Press); the first court was held at the home of Mr. Nettles, now known as the E. J. Swan place, east of Barton on the Perrin road; the first election was held July 4th. 1857, in Salt Hill community; the first store was established William Reasoner, also in same community, about 1855 or '56: The first house was built in 1854 by John Wood, a one-room log house with the chimney at the south end. When this community was first settled the Methodists held servlices in two places, one in the southern part, in Salt Hill school house located on the south part of the Henry Maxey land, until the

Oak Glen school house was built. The first Sunday school in the northeast part was organized by the late T. E. Owen, under a large oak tree 11/2 miles northeast of the present church of Barton Chapel, in 1876. In cold weather it was held in the homes of the members until Brown school house was built. In 1908 the two churches consolidated, forming the present church of Barton

Chapel.

James W. Knox Passes Away

The many friends of James W. Knox, age 85, pause in reverence to his passing away, Friday, Christmas Eve, 1937, at his home in Jacksboro.

Mr. Knox was born at Charleston, Tennessee, in a family of nine children, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Knox, who were planters and slave owners, and near relatives were bankers and merchants. He came with his parents, directly after the Civil War, to Veal Station, in Parker County, as that was then one of the best school towns in the West. After a short time, Mr. Knox, though very death. young, came on to Jacksboro and for a few years clerked in a store. He then went into the dry goods business which he followed for many years. His parents and brothers came to Jacksboro later, the parents continuing to live here until their death.

Around the year 1890 Judge T. D. Sporer as president, and D. L. Knox as cashier, organized the First National Bank, in the court house where the sheriff's office is at present. The next year Mr. Knox went in as president and remained in this capacity until 1933 when he became the chairman of the board of directors of the bank.
